### Food Technology



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# SCIENCE REPORT

### **Science Week**

It has been a busy couple of weeks in the Science department. Plenty of fun, learning and experimenting to be had!

The highlight on our calendar each year is National Science Week. This year, we took 50 students down to Taronga Zoo, to participate in a special challenge designed by the zoo and the University of Sydney in celebration of Science Week. Entitled "Operation Earth: A Conservation Mission" students were given 10 challenges focusing on the conservation efforts to protect the Sumatran Tiger, Greater Bilby, Sun Bear and many more animals, from impacts such as climate change, habitat loss and poaching.

Also, in the Science Faculty, Year 7 have been engaging in activities that are "out of this world", learning about our solar system and the likelihood of humans being able to inhabit another planet.

Year 9 STEM have been investigating the production of plastics and the impact that microplastics in particular, are having on our environment. They tried their hand at making a bioplastic called casein, by mixing warm milk with vinegar. The "curds" that are produced (from the curdled milk!), have been used to make plastics for centuries. Let's just say that the smell and texture of the casein did not appeal to most students!




