PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Welcome back to Term 4.

The school has continued to cope well in these very challenging times. The Higher School Certificate is well underway and I would like to congratulate year 12 for the mature manner in which they have faced adversity in recent times. Due to Covid requirements, no exam could exceed 75 students - so for the first time, the exams have been staged simultaneously in two different parts of the school. Furthermore, I would like to thank the Kincumber Neighbourhood Centre, which has offered its services in the unlikely event of a positive test at the school.

Year 12 have undertaken their graduation at the end of last term. Unlike previous years, there was no audience allowed to attend. I would like to take the opportunity to acknowledge the incredible work of both Mr Nicol and the Year 12 Year Advisor, Claire Barber, for making the event so memorable and rewarding. Through Mr Nicol, the school made the decision to engage a videographer for the day and the event was live streamed and then a high-quality production was created for students and their families as a memory of this special day. Mrs Barber organised a COVID teacher dance for the students and included features such as a student guard of honour to mark Year 12's important rite of passage. The event incredibly generally well received by the students and the wider community, who appreciated the extra length the school went to make the day so special.

The Year 12 Formal will be the next step in the journey, which will occur in the school hall. The school is incredibly hopeful that the COVID guidelines will allow parents and carers to participate in the pre-formal celebrations as they have in previous years. The night promises to be special and unique and a few surprises are in store for this particularly special group of young people.

The impact of COVID this year has been quite significant, although current guidelines are foreshadowing a return to the school experience prior to the virus. The next updates for the Department of Education are gazetted for Week 4 (November 2), which should provide greater clarity for end of year events, P&C Meetings and Professional Learning Days. A further announcement is planned for Week 8 (November 30) which will support planning for 2021. Finally, an announcement will occur in the Summer Holidays on 18 January, when advice will be conformed for the 2021 school year.

The school is currently working hard creating the school plan for 2021-2024. I would like to thank the parents, who were randomly selected, for their time and thoughtful and considered responses in their phone calls from Mr Riley, Mr Broadbent and myself. The process has also begun to talk to staff and students, and this will be collated to create a plan that builds on the strengths of the school and addresses areas identified for future improvement. This plan will be completed by the end of the year and will be available on the school website for further thoughts and contribution.



An area that was addressed widely in the recent parent forums was the standard of the school uniform particularly its appearance, variations, suitability, cost and quality. As a result, the school has created a Uniform Committee, managed by Mr Riley, Mr Waters and Mr Crawford. They and their team will investigate what changes (if any) are required. The first step of the process will be to talk to both students and parents/carers. In both cases, a random sample will be interviewed by a member of the Uniform Committee, to explore the issue. Those not selected will be given the opportunity to participate in a Google form, to ensure that consultation is extensive and all are given an opportunity to contribute. Please note that if any changes are suggested, they will be implemented over a three-year period of time, ensuring that families have significant time to manage any changes. Finally, for the immediate future, cam\n I please ask parents to consider purchasing uniforms from Lowes, who support the P&C and our students financially, and make changes to the uniform only based on their advice.

Finally, it is my pleasure to announce the school leadership team for next year. After a hotly contested debate in which all students were exceptional, it is my pleasure to announce the School Captains for 2021 are Kyte Cardy and Amelia Lowe. The Support Unit Captain is Chloe Beilby. The School Vice Captains are Bilguun Wicks and Leylani Kovacs. The School leaders are Samson Mathews, Joel Blyton, Imogen Gray and Caitlin Main. This is an exceptional group of young people, who will build strongly on the work of the outstanding leadership team of this year. Congratulations to all.

Once a week, lessons will focus on areas identified as those where improvement can be made across the school. Student progress will be tracked using google classroom. Year 8 have been working on volume and transformations in geometry. The photos below show students determining which cylinder, made of an A4 sheet, has the greatest volume, using popcorn as a novel measuring tool! We also used pattern blocks to create some stylish images and their reflections.


ENGINEERING STUDIES REPORT

YEAR 7 & 8 GENERATION TOMORROW - HIGH RESOLVES PEAK EXPERIENCES

During Week 1 this term Years 7 and 8 had the opportunity to take part in a *Peak Experience* run by the educational organisation *High Resolves*. Kincumber High School has been in partnership to deliver high quality citizenship, sustainability, wellbeing and social justice education to our students through critical thinking, reflection and real-world thinking and action.

Years 7 and 8 undertake this learning as part of their Generation Tomorrow (GT) classes, and in addition to their classroom learning experiences each student participated in a 2-hour peak experiences facilitated by our partners at High Resolves. During these sessions students engage in real-world learning activities and build skills in collaboration, communication and critical thinking by undertaking immersive group-work activities and reflective exercises.

The focus for Year 7 this year was 'Identity and Purpose', while Year 8 investigated the concept of a 'Just Society'. Organising and participating staff were incredibly proud of how well KHS students embraced and got involved with the learning and High Resolves facilitators remarked on the forward thinking, inclusive qualities of our students.

At the end of each session students completed an 'I resolve to...' card on which they were asked to set a positive resolution about what they will strive to achieve to make the world around them a better place. Collectively, students came up with very insightful and mature suggestions as part of this activity. On the right is a collage of just some of these positive resolutions completed by our Year 7 and 8 students. On the opposite page a series of photographs of students participating in the workshops can be seen.

Later this term our Year 9 and 10 students will also have the opportunity to participate in a *Peak Experience* tailored to their context.

YEAR 7 & 8 GENERATION TOMORROW - PROJECT-BASED LEARNING

Project Based Learning is a student-centred learning strategy in which students gain knowledge and skills by working for an extended period of time to investigate and respond to an authentic, engaging, and complex question, problem, or challenge. This format of learning has been incorporated within the Generation Tomorrow programs for Years 7 and 8 at Kincumber High School.





BY HIGH RESOLVES

Last term Year 8 GT classes completed a PBL activity in which student groups filmed, edited and produced a short video to submit into the national Videos for Change competition. Videos for Change gives young people the opportunity to make one-minute videos on social issues that they care about. It helps them build social advocacy skills and gives them a global platform to amplify their message. The Videos for Change concept which is facilitated by High Resolves gained national attention when it was popularised on the Channel 10 program – *The Project*.



In their GT classes Year 8 students, in groups each produced an entry for the Videos for Change competition last term. Students responded positively to the program and developed insightful and creative videos bringing awareness to social justice issues and importantly, each video comes with a powerful 'call to action' in which the viewer is encouraged to make a difference in an effort to deal with these big issues occurring within our community.



Kincumber High School was proud to facilitate many entries by Year 8 into the national competition and we wish all our students the best of luck in the judging process.

GENERATION TOMORROW

Gaining inspiration from their 'Identity and Purpose' Peak Experience in Week 1 this term Year 7 GT classes have now begun their own PBL activity entitled *Positive Campaigns*.

In groups students have been tasked with developing a campaign that is designed to leverage the emotions of the public to positively raise awareness about important issues present in our society and community.

It is still very early on in the process but already student groups have generated many innovative ideas to tackle the big issues facing communities and the world at large. Projects range in scope from assisting the elderly and supporting young people to raising awareness about racial discrimination and climate change.

Students have also come up with a wide variety of ways to get their message across. Groups have made proposals including writing songs, creating podcasts, recording videos, creating billboards and many more...

Projects will be under development all term and will be unveiled and presented at the end of the year.

Year 9 Visual Arts 2020

Miss McNaught and I teach Year 9 Visual Arts, 2020. We feel absolutely privileged to teach such an amazing group of young people. The class is incredibly diligent, talented and we are so proud of the amazing works they've created in 2020.

The class has developed a triptych of graphite pencil portraits in the style of Realism. Students have acquired an understanding of visual measurement skills, tonal rendering techniques and blending methods, using a paper tortillion and kneadable eraser.

Recently, students used Keanes Lumina Porcelain to create a series of drinking vessels, created with the pinch pot technique, inspired by visual qualities of their past artworks. The porcelain cups have been treated with cobalt carbonate, various underglazes and a transparent glaze and are now ready for firing.

School Travel for 2021



2021 school travel applications are now open

Applications for student travel in 2021 opened from Monday 12 October 2020.

Students who require a School Opal card or travel pass for 2021 can now <u>apply</u> online. A new application should be submitted if a student is applying for a school travel pass for the first time or requesting an additional pass as a result of a new shared parental responsibility situation (e.g. joint custody).

Students who have changed school/campus, changed address, repeated a year or received an expiry notification from Transport for NSW for their school travel entitlement should <u>re-apply or update their details</u>.

*Applications must be completed by the student's parent or legal guardian if the student is aged under 16 years. Students 16 years and over must complete the application form themselves.

Where there is a change of distance eligibility based on a student's grade, the system will automatically update a student's entitlement if they meet the new criteria. If they do not meet the new eligibility criteria, they will receive an expiry notification via email.

Students who have an entitlement approved under a medical condition which is due to expire will receive a notification advising them to re-apply.

Term Bus Pass holders will receive a notification to re-apply.

If a student needs to update their information or re-apply, they should go online to https://apps.transport.nsw.gov.au/ssts/updateDetails

Applications need to be submitted before **31 December 2020** to ensure that current student entitlements are updated and their current entitlement/card remains valid. If their application is submitted after **31 December 2020**, the system will automatically cancel an entitlement/card and a new one will need to be issued.

Students in the Opal network applying for a SSTS or Term Bus Pass entitlement for the first time will receive their card at their nominated postal address. Cards will be mailed out from January 2021.

Students residing in Rural and Regional (R&R) areas should receive their travel pass at the commencement of the new school year from their nominated operator, this may be distributed via the school or sent direct to their address. **Note**: some R&R operators do not issue travel passes. Students/Parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a pass.

New Concession Entitlement Cards

Transport for NSW will be replacing the below cards with Transport Concession Entitlement Cards (TCEC) from October 2020:

- Senior Secondary Student Concession Card (16 years and over) also used by Mature Secondary Students (18 years and over), Distance Education Students and Home School Students
- Proof of Age card (when a student under 16 years of age looks older)
- Boarder Rail Pass.

All previous cards will be valid until they expire. Students who require a Transport Concession Entitlement Card should speak with their school administration staff.
