PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Welcome back to 2020

Unfortunately, it has been an incredibly sad start to the year with the passing of one of our Year 8 students Abby Hodge. Abby was a beautiful young girl who was much loved by her classmates and staff and will be remembered for her kind nature and most delightful sense of humour. Kincumber Rotary has undertaken a fundraising site on behalf of the family, and I have been overwhelmed by the support provided by our community. It was hoped that we can raise \$15,000, which will be matched by the Dick Smith foundation. At the time of writing, we have raised over \$16,000. The school year has started strongly, with over 200 Year 7 students, many of who attended the Great Aussie Bush Camp. These students have generally settled well into their new surroundings and taking advantage of the opportunities provided to them. These students are the first to undertake the Generation Tomorrow program, which Mr Riley outlines later in this newsletter. We are excited by the program and hope this supports the transition into High School and better meets the needs of future learners.

The school has undertaken some massive infrastructure changes over the holidays. Most notably, the COLA has been completed and was officially opened on Monday, 17 February, by Member for Terrigal, Adam Crouch. This will be an invaluable asset to the school in so many ways. For sport at the school, it will provide cover and protection from the elements and can also be utilised to provide shelter as students move to and from the school buses. Furthermore, it provides a space large enough to host a whole school assembly, as the school hall cannot currently cater for the whole 1050 student population at the one time. Finally, the COLA will be an amazing community asset and has already been utilised by Rugby League, Rugby Union and Soccer Clubs whilst the grounds have been closed due to unseasonably wet weather.





The school has also undertaken considerable landscaping and painting throughout the school and the grounds are looking amazing. This combination of Planned Maintenance and School Funded Work is providing first class facilities for our students and continuing to build the pride that the community has in their local comprehensive High School. These changes have also included a million dollar renovation of F Block to include two new classrooms, two renovated classrooms, three staffrooms, a new café and a new bathroom to cater better for the students in our Support Unit. These massive changes will improve the quality of teaching being delivered at the school and enable our school to better meet the changing needs of education.





In the last month, I have had the pleasure of attending a number of awards evenings to celebrate the success of students at our school. I attended the Sydney North Annual Awards Presentation Evening, where our sports stars Kaya Ardita and Abbey Cracknell were recognised as recipients of the prestigious Sydney North School Blue. Following this, I would like to also congratulate Cameron Taylor of Year 10 who was selected to represent Australia in the Under 16 men's softball side. These are truly wonderful achievements.

Last month also saw the annual Evening of Excellence, which recognised the top performers in all years and culminated in the presentation if the school dux to Roan Brown of Year 12, for his outstanding results in his final years of school. I would like to personally thank my predecessors Gus Plater, Graeme Davies, Mark Macaulay and Janine Debenham, for attending and congratulate all the students who received awards on this prestigious evening. I would finally like to publically thank a number of staff for their efforts on the night, including Head Teacher Teaching and Learning, Ben Nicol and recently retired staff member Steve Fortey for his final presentation evening with the school.

Thank you for a great start to the year and looking forward to talking again soon.

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PASS OUT/EARLY LEAVER PROCEDURE

Thank you for your ongoing support. Currently we need your support when wanting to collect your student from school during the day.

1. Send a note in with the student:

The note must state the following information:

- Full name of student
- Time leaving and returning, or state if not returning
- Reason for early departure
- Date, signature and phone number

2. Student to bring the note to the front office:

The student will bring the note to the office and have it signed by a Deputy Principal. On a Tuesday Years 9 & 10 students will be sent to the PE staffroom and staff there will sign the notes.

3. Pass out Issued:

Once the note is signed the student will bring the note back to the front office and a pass out slip will be printed and given to the student.

This slip is then used to allow the student to leave the class at the designated time and leave school grounds.

MATHS

This year we have begun implementing a new focus for both Year 9 and Year 11 students called 'Maths in Trade Pathway'. Mr White is running both classes, and it has been great to see the engagement of the students as they begin the course. This term's focus is 'Measurement'. Students have been practising not only measuring accurately in a real-life setting, but also then looking at costing out materials needed for a number of projects and working out exactly what would be needed to complete a project with a minimum of wastage, but also ensuring they do not run out of required materials. As preparation for entering trades, this course is helping them build up an excellent background of skills and understanding. Year 11 have





done a brief survey on how useful they think the course has been so far, and it is pleasing to note their positive comments about feeling their skills grow. The photos below show the focus Year 9 students are putting into accuracy in measurement.

We have welcomed three new staff this year – Mr Hunter, Mr Kelly and Mr Regler. Mr Regler's Year 7 class had a lot of fun doing an outside 'Geometry Treasure Hunt' recently – they had to find a number of different shapes in the school environment. It was terrific to see the enthusiasm students had for searching out various shapes.

A reminder that all students in all years should have their own calculators – if you pay \$24 to the front office and bring your receipt to maths, we can issue a calculator straight away.



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DEPUTY PRINCIPAL REPORT - MR MATT RILEY

Generation Tomorrow - our new Stage 4 Curriculum offering

As we endeavour to provide future-focused learning at Kincumber High School, we are excited to announce the implementation of a brand new subject for both Year 7 and Year 8 students. Generation Tomorrow, or GT as it appears on student timetables, comprises of two lessons in each fortnightly lesson cycle. It has four key components which focus on technology skills to enhance learning, wellbeing concepts, Project Based Learning and lesson topics from the High Resolves organisation. It is represented in the diagram below.



We acknowledge that many of our young people may be quite adept when it comes to using a mobile phone for things such as Instagram, Snapchat and playing games, but may not be as advanced when it comes to other technology skills that may enhance their learning and future work prospects. Skills such as the use of Excel spreadsheets, email protocols, file organisation, touch typing and the use of the full range of application from G-Suite and Microsoft Office 365, will be nurtured to provide a solid base of technological competence.

Wellbeing content includes some aspects of the Friendology program, designed to educate and upskill students to understand that friendship groups may grow, shrink or become more diverse as students begin high school and this need not be a source of tension.

The High Resolves program sets out to align young people's "everyday actions with the long-term collective interest of society [to] create a more inclusive, just and optimistic world". The High Resolves organisation provides learning activities and content critical to young people's capacity to effect generational change. Some of these lesson topics include personal identity, inclusivity, labels, stereotypes and empathy. High Resolves encourages students to consider their potential impact on social justice issues in their local communities and across the globe.



We feel that Kincumber High School is already active in a few of these areas with *Clean4Shore*, removing rubbish from the Brisbane Waters, *SecondBite*, repurposing perfectly edible food items from Coles and taking it to the Kincumber Neighbourhood Centre for redistribution to needy members of the community, and finally the *Green Team* which targets recycling and sustainability practices in our school.



We will be looking for more issues and opportunities for our students to make a difference. The program content is delivered by a small group of specially trained teachers to ensure quality and consistency. More information about *High Resolves* is available at https://highresolves.org/

An engaging feature of the High Resolves program is the *Videos for Change* national film-making competition, supported through their established partnership with Channel Ten's 'The Project'. Through a Project Based Learning (PBL) approach, our students will have the opportunity to develop their project ideas, firstly in Year 7 at a local level and then in Year 8 at the national competition level. The crucial PBL aspect of an authentic public audience is a key component to hone the students' focus on producing their best work.

We are truly excited to implement this future focused learning initiative and are confident that our recent school infrastructure improvements will continue to meet the needs of our contemporary students. All GT lessons have been prioritised in the school timetable and scheduled into four renovated classroom spaces. New paint, printed blinds and modular collaborative coloured furniture has been installed to support this valuable learning product.

We endeavour to celebrate and share the important learning concepts that our Year 7 and 8 students encounter throughout the year as they engage with our new Stage 4 curriculum offering, *Generation Tomorrow*.

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Safety learning program



Traffic and Parking around your School

Parking rules are designed to stop vehicles from parking where it would be dangerous or inconvenient for others. Please consider the residents when parking in streets surrounding your school.

A **School Zone** is the area around a school with a speed limit of 40 km/h. Between the School Zone and End School Zone signs you must obey the school zone speed limit. The school zone speed limit only applies on gazetted school days and during the times shown on the sign.



School Bus lights – buses use signs and orange flashing 'wigwag' lights to warn motorists and pedestrians that they are picking up or setting down school children. The lights begin to flash when the bus stops and the doors are opened. They keep flashing for about 30 seconds after the doors close and continue even after the bus moves off. You must not drive past the bus in the same direction at more than 40 km/h while the 'wigwag' lights are flashing as there may be children crossing or about to cross the road.



A **No Parking Zone** means that you must not stop for more than two minutes. You must remain in or within three metres of the vehicle. No Parking Zones are suitable for dropping off and picking up.









THESE SIGNS MEAN YOU MAY STOP HERE TO DROP OFF / PICK UP

BUT YOU MUST

- stop for up to 2 minutes only
- · stay within 3 metres of vehicle

Kids look to you to keep them safe - please park legally in school zones HEAVY FINES and DEMERIT POINTS APPLY

A Bus Zone means that the area is restricted for bus use only. If hours of operation are shown, the restriction only applies to this time. You may use this area outside of these times.



A No Stopping Zone means no stopping at any time.




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Other times when you must not stop

You must not stop your vehicle (that is, bring it to a stop and either stay with the vehicle or leave it parked) in the following circumstances:


- Double parked (that is in the road alongside a car that is parked)
- Across a driveway or footpath
- On a median strip or traffic island
- On footpaths and nature strips
- On or within 20 metres before and 10 metres after a children's crossing or pedestrian crossing



- Within an intersection
- Within 10 metres of an intersecting road at an intersection without traffic lights unless signposted otherwise




- In Bus Stop, Bus Zone, Taxi Stand or Taxi Zone signed areas
- At least one metre from any other parked vehicle, close as possible and parallel to the kerb, and facing the same direction as the traffic lane



- Within three metres of any double centre lines
- Within 20 metres before and 10 metres after a bus stop

Adherence to signposting, linemarking and road rules around your school will assist in providing a safe environment for the school community and residents.
