## PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Welcome back to Term Four.

The school term has begun well and there are many changes which are occurring. Year 12 have commenced their Higher School Certificate and have been working well in their exams. The final exam for our students is on November 4, with our Food Technology students completing their formal examinations.

These have been a particular special group of young people and we wish them every success in their exams. A significant number of students have already received early entry to university and the school is expecting some very strong results. The school formal will be held this year at Drifters Wharf in Gosford on Wednesday November 9 and the HSC results will be released on Thursday 15 December.

At the time of writing the rules regarding Covid have changed again. On 30 September, National Cabinet announced that from Friday 14 October 2022, people who test positive to COVID-19 do not need to isolate. In line with this announcement, the NSW Department of Education have worked with NSW Health to support all schools to adapt to this change while continuing to prioritise student and staff wellbeing by minimising the risk of COVID-19 transmissions.

Students and staff should continue to stay home when they are sick.

Students, staff and visitors should only attend school when they are symptom free. We strongly encourage all students, staff and visitors to follow the advice of NSW Health. We will continue to send home students or staff displaying symptoms.

Anyone who believes they have been exposed to COVID-19 is strongly recommended to monitor for symptoms and test if they have any concerns, as well as wear a mask. We will continue to support our families to use rapid antigen tests (RATs) if symptomatic or if you believe you have been exposed to COVID-19. RAT testing may help identify the infection early and is important if you are in contact with people at greater risk of serious illness if exposed to COVID-19.



Our school will continue to operate with our baseline COVID-smart measures in place throughout Term 4 to minimise transmission and keep our school open. This includes a combination of layered safety measures such as maintaining hygiene and cleaning practices, using rapid antigen testing (RAT) when experiencing symptoms, maximising natural ventilation, strongly encouraged vaccinations and strongly encouraging mask-wearing particularly when indoors and/or physical distancing is not possible.

In staffing news, the school is excited to announce that Mark Powell has been successful in obtaining the permanent General Assistant position through merit. We have an incredibly well maintained and attractive school and this appointment is recognition of Mark's (and others) work over the past few years.

Finally, the school is undertaking a number of school improvements as we start the term. In all the female toilets feminine hygiene stations have been installed as part of a government initiative and will become operable in the next week. Furthermore, stainless steel handrails are being installed in the quadrangles and will be completed by the end of the year. The carpark upgrade has begun slowly and is slated for completion in early 2023 with undercover facilities for the Support Unit students available to access assisted travel in the morning and afternoons. Finally, the school has begun to draw up plans for the long-anticipated library upgrade which will be completed by the end of the financial year. There is a lot occurring and we appreciate our communities understanding as these major renovations occur.

Overall, it has been a settled and productive start to the term and I'd like to thank students and staff for all their hard work as we move towards the end of the year. I'd like to also thank our parents and carers for their ongoing support of the school. We really appreciate the communities support in terms of homework, attendance and school uniform. This support is the reason Kincumber High School has such a wonderful reputation and is such a great place to teach and learn.

It's been a busy start to the school term with the return of Years 7-11 and Year 12 sitting their HSC Examinations. Firstly I'd like to wish all Year 12 students the very best for each of their examinations.

The Aboriginal Education Team has enjoyed working closely with Jade Bush, our new Aboriginal Education Officer on several exciting projects happening. On Thursday 27 October, our school will play host to the Junior AECG Workshops and Establishment Day. Kincumber High School along with our partner primary schools are forming this inaugural Tjudibaring AECG initiative. Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students throughout our learning community will be able to use this forum as a platform for student voice, and it will be an important channel for strengthening cultural recognition and propelling Aboriginal academic and sporting successes in our schools.

For Year 11, the term started with the completion of Life Ready in Week 1. This course is mandatory across the state and its delivery showcases important life lessons, provides skills for managing risks and making smart choices. Many thanks to Phil Goucher for his work in organising this week. The beginning of this term also marked the start of Year 12 for our Year 11s. For the next four terms, Year 11 (Year 12 2023) will embark on their most important schooling year, which culminates with the HSC Examinations. As I have said before, despite the HSC year feeling daunting for many, the supports in place and available for our students at Kincumber High School, along with the many celebratory Year 12 events, will make these next twelve months one of the best and most memorable years of their schooling.

It was a pleasure recently seeing Year 9 exhibit their safe health choices exhibitions as part of their PDHPE assessments. These exhibits showcased terrific teamwork, important health messages and creativity. In the first half of this term, Year 9 will complete a series of yearly assessments. These tasks will bring together much of what students have explored this year and I remind Year 9 of the importance of early preparation and seeking teacher feedback prior to final submissions.

It has been a positive start to Term 4 for Year 7. This term sees the culmination of their first year of high school. Like Year 9, they too will complete a series of yearly assessments over the coming weeks. Submitting assignment drafts and practise responses for feedback is something that I highly recommend. On November 3-4, Year 7 will participate in Surf Education Days. These days will provide some reminders for staying safe in the water this summer.

I'd also like to congratulate all students who recently received 90% Attendance Certificates for their outstanding attendance during Term 3. Finally, I encourage students to participate in the Remembrance Day commemorative activities that Miss McDonogh has planned. This important day will be soon upon us, and the planned activities will contribute to a fine Library Exhibition commemorating the sacrifices of those lost during World War I and other conflicts.










#### ATTENDANCE TEAM REPORT

#### **ENGLISH FACULTY REPORT**

As the final term begins, the English faculty have farewelled our year 12 students from official lessons. However, we are still available for any last minute editing of essays as they study for their upcoming HSC exams. It is important for all Standard, Advanced and Extension students to use this time wisely and revise their study notes and essay plans. Year 11 students sat their preliminary exams in Week 9 and 10 last term and we now begin the cycle again as they are introduced to their HSC content with the Common Module. Setting up good study and learning habits from the beginning, will ensure a more productive and successful learning experience.

Year 10 are completing and presenting their multimodal presentations, embracing the tyranny and bold ambitions held by Macbeth and his wife, and which are due this week. Late last term, Year 9 completed their assessment, writing an in-class essay on Who is to blame for the deaths of Romeo and Juliet? They are now working on the unit "The Human Footprint - the value of sustainability". Within this unit, we examine a variety of texts, to examine significant environmental issues that face our world. Year 8 are enjoying their "Things that go bump in the night" unit, exploring the horror genre. A creative writing assessment that embraces the elements of this genre is set for the coming weeks. Last term we also saw Year 7 complete their in-class essay on "Everybody has the right to live in peace" and are to be commended for their writing efforts. This term begins their study of the basic elements of drama, through an introduction of Shakespeare as well as other dramatic texts. We look forward to seeing students embrace their dramatic side 😉

Whilst the end of year is looming, there is still significant learning and study opportunities. As always, we encourage all students to read for 15 to 20 minutes each night and chat to their teachers about areas of growth that they would like to see occur in their literacy development.





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#### **MATHEMATICS NEWS**

All Stage 4 and 5 Mathematics classes are currently working on assignments. As this is a compulsory component for Stage 6, we hope to let students get used to the concept before then. Year 7 is on Area and Perimeter, Year 8 on Geometry and Coding, and Years 9 and 10 cover a variety of topics. Due dates are on the notifications and we encourage all students to complete these tasks promptly and carefully.

Year 9 Enrichment Mathematics have just commenced a unit on 'Knot Theory'. We recently spent a lesson constructing a wide variety of named knots using pipe cleaners, as you can see from the images below. Next we will be learning how to tie fishing knots and making macrame bracelets.





After studying the impacts that palm oil production has on the habitats of orangutans, 8N were determined to not just learn about this problem, but to also make a difference. Orangutans have 97% of their DNA in common with humans.

Orangutans are critically endangered due to logging, palm oil plantations and poaching.












#### TAS FACULTY REPORT

## Year 9 Engineering

During Term 3, the Year 9 Engineering class designed and built throwing devices with the aim of finding out who could create the device that could throw an object the furthest distance. Initially, they researched about catapults and trebuchets and came up with their own designs. We then headed to the workshops to build their chosen designs and test!









# Year 8 Technology Mandatory (TAS)

During Term 3, our Year 8 students undertake a variety of strands within TAS. In Engineering, students were looking at what is an engineer and what role does energy and friction play to drive mechanisms. Students have designed and built a car that is propelled using potential energy from a twisted rubber band. Preliminary testing in 8Tech4 saw Cooper in the lead (9.8m).









In Material Technologies-Metal, students were designing and producing BBQ spatulas. Students incorporated bottle openers, sausage forks, cutting edges and even decorative designs into their spatula. While heat treating the spatula, students developed an understanding of heat treatments used on metals to modify their properties and ensure no rust appears on their finished products. Whilst many students didn't appreciate the dirty and noisy environment while working with metal, they did enjoy their finished products!






#### SCIENCE FACULTY REPORT

We are thrilled to have our students back in class for the final term of the school year. During Term 3, Year 10 were in their element investigating a range of exciting chemical reactions, including demonstrations of the reactivity of sodium metal. Meanwhile, our Year 7 super scientists made models of the phases of the moon that were out of this world, as part of the our astronomy unit. Our Year 10 Marine Studies classes had a whale of a time on a whale watching cruise and got a hands on experience at the Shark and Ray Centre.

This term, our Year 10 students have begun to investigate motion and Newton's Laws, through their connection to driver reaction time. Our Year 7 students are developing their microscopy skills, by investigating cells and classification. Meanwhile, our Year 9 Marine cohort have been developing a deeper understanding of fish anatomy through a range of dissections. We are looking forward to seeing what the students can do in the remainder of the year.
