The NAPLAN results for 2022 have arrived and will this be distributed soon. Initial indicator showed growth in some areas, and we await the value-added data to see the overall school performance. In 2023 the exam will occur earlier in the year and it is the intention that the students Maths and English teacher\s will retain their class as the move into the new school year. This will ensure consistency of teaching practice and allow staff to better address areas of strength and explore areas for development.

The school has continued to work towards overall improvement and new handrails will be installed throughout the quadrangle in the following weeks. The F block roofing upgrade has been largely completed and new large television screens have been installed within the hall. This will improve the viewing experience of those in the hall and hopefully allow for third -party agreements in order for the school to recoup the money in the future. I would like to thank both Adam Crouch and the hard-working P&C of the school (particularly Matt Barrett) who were able to attain a grant through school and community partnerships which enabled this major school upgrade to occur. The school has also been able to source a \$300,000 grant to upgrade the library and plans are currently underway to occur. In total there will be about \$2 million spent on the school in this calendar year.

It is an incredibly busy time in schools. I would like to thank students for all their hard work and application to their studies as we move towards the final term of school. Furthermore, I'd like to acknowledge the hard work of staff who are trying to manage learning in amongst a major health crisis and are doing an exceptional job. Finally, I would like to personally thank our parents and carers for their ongoing support. The return of annual events such as Kincumba Shines, Subject Selection Evening and Graduations bodes well for the future.



ENGLISH FACULTY REPORT









Term 3 Overview

It's been full steam ahead for the English faculty with the Trial HSC behind us. Year 12 have been busy writing practice essays and teachers have been industriously marking so students can reach their potential in their course. All year groups are studying some great units that are pushing their reading, writing and comprehension skills.

Year 7 are enjoying an examination of related themes associated with the global concept of War and Peace. Thoughtful and mature conversations are occurring in regards to human rights issues, particularly examining the right of the child in such texts as the novel *Parvana* by Deborah Ellis, the film 'My name is Malala', 'Sadako and a Thousand Paper Cranes' and 'Malala's address to the United Nations'. Classes 7U and 7I commemorated Hiroshima Day (6 August) with discussion of the day and its impact on the world. Students viewed a short video, read a picture book on Sadako and made paper cranes as symbols of peace to fortify their knowledge on this subject. All students are working on their persuasive writing skills as they work towards their in-class assessment in the coming weeks.

Year 8 are examining various forms of media and how opinion and interpretation affects an individual's response to an issue within society. Assessment notification was sent out in Week 4, as students spend time in class and at home creating a podcast that identifies how the media presents varying sides to an issue.

Year 9 are studying Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet in class. Whilst many students initially fear Shakespeare's plays, many have come to see how his language, themes and characters have transcended through time. The question of who is to blame for the death of Romeo and Juliet is the focus of their assessment task, and notification will be sent out in the next week.

It's "Double, Double, Toil and Trouble" with Year 10 as they study Shakespeare's Macbeth, examining the downfall of the Scottish nobleman Macbeth and his wife Lady Macbeth. Student's are embracing the themes of ambition and power and exploring the symbolism embedded throughout the Elizabethan Tragedy.

Year 11 are focused on the study of their final module before their exams at the end of the term and Year 12 are busy with their Trial HSC exams during Weeks 5 and 6. Donut nourishment has been required, especially for Extension II, who have their major works which were due at the end of Week 5.

Students and staff are busy writing, deconstructing and developing their love of literature. As always, we encourage all students to read 15 to 20 minutes each day to help improve their literacy skills.



Year 9 Engineering - Bridge Structures

During Term 2 and the beginning of Term 3, the Year 9 class have been working on an engineering challenge to make the strongest bridge possible, using kebab skewers.

Firstly, the students researched various types of bridges and then went on to design their own bridge to span a gap of 300mm.

Next was the construction of the bridge, where students used PVA glue and kebab skewers and their technical drawing designs of their bridges which had been laminated.

Once all the bridges had been completed, we tested them to destruction!! – The winning design held 15kg before failing.



Yr 10 Engineering - Motion Machines


During Term 2, Year 10 Engineering students were required to design a motion machine. It needed to incorporate three movements into their machine.


Students worked hard at producing a quality machine that worked and suited the design brief.

The module culminated in the students selecting, preparing and cooking a seafood dish of their choice for friends and family members who critiqued the overall quality, taste and presentation of their meals.

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Sensational Scientists

Our faculty has been thrilled at the projects and excursion we were able to complete during Term 2. The super scientists in Year 9 and Year 10 STEM worked together to compete in the Science and Engineering Challenge. They collaborated to construct a range of bridges, circuits, Mars rovers and artificial hands, as part of an all day challenge. While they did not make it to the next round, they demonstrated exceptional teamwork and skill.

Our Year 12 chemists visited Distillery Botanica, to study chemical reactions on an industrial scale and had the opportunity to discuss with the owners how they used different techniques, ingredients and trials to produce a range of niche beverages.

Meanwhile, our Year 8 cohort had an enlightening experience developing their model houses to demonstrate their knowledge of electrical circuits, while Year 7 had a hair raising experience investigating static electricity.

We are looking forward seeing what our students can achieve this term.

MATHEMATICS REPORT

We have been doing so many hands-on activities in Enrichment Mathematics recently ... Year 9 completed a unit on codes, and would give James Bond a run for his money with their speed of cracking codes! Lemon juice, bicarbonate of soda and milk were also used to create 'invisible ink', to further improve their spycraft ... and I only destroyed one attempt while revealing the message.

The highlight of the unit was students using ASCII code to create bracelets with their names written, using a system of two coloured beads to represent 'binary'. We did shorten long names, as each symbol uses four characters. Year 9 are now completing an assessment task which includes a portfolio of origami creations, and are taking great care making sure their folded pieces are accurate and folded carefully. Prior to that, students used geometrical constructions to create traditional tangrams and 'magic egg' tangrams and solved a number of puzzles involving them.











Year 10 Enrichment Mathematics were involved in an exciting 'Amazing Race' day at Avoca Public School last term. The students were terrific ambassadors for KHS, running activities and making sure the younger students were engaged with their learning. I was so proud of these thoughtful and patient students and the Avoca teachers appreciated their help.













As part of our current unit on Problem Solving, Year 10 Enrichment have made their own Soma Cubes from small wooden cubes. These are then used to create structures, resembling three dimensional tetris. Mr Nicol has been a tremendous help with this, actually getting the three dimensional printers to 'print' full sets of Soma pieces so the students have a very professional and colourful looking set to keep. Even better, they are actually made from corn and not plastic!







It's not all hands-on activities though, Year 10 have also worked through some very challenging content on Locus (the path a point follows given certain conditions), Truth tables in a unit on Formal Logic, and Conditional Probability. I am amazed at how well students have completed activities in these areas which are not generally studied in a Stage 5 setting.


