PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Welcome to the final newsletter of the term.

The school has been incredibly busy, and I would like to thank the staff, students, parents and carers for such a strong start to the school year. As the term draws to a close, I would like to take this opportunity to draw attention to some of the school priority areas and some of the changes that are occurring at the present time.

Positive attendance is one of the key factors in achieving academic success. I am pleased to report that our attendance figures have remained consistently high, which is a testament to the dedication of our students and their families. It is essential that we continue to maintain this positive momentum throughout the year, as regular attendance is crucial for effective learning. NEW SCHOOL BYTES FINANCE SYSTEM

Kincumber High School has transitioned to the school bytes finance system.

All existing payment links that have been sent to you previously in emails can still be used and will automatically redirect to the new system. A School Bytes portal will be available for you to register and begin using: https://portal.schoolbytes.education

All previous payments made through the old system will be migrated to the new School Bytes finance system and portal.


The School Bytes portal provides flexibility for you to conveniently:

- Make school payments online (including paying for multiple sibling at once)
- Use a family credit to pay for an activity or school contributions
- Download a receipt for payments made
- View all historical payments in one place

This can be done where you want at any time: day or night.

Through the portal, you will easily be able to download a receipt once a payment has been made and have access to view all historical payments when needed. Online payments are processed in real-time and can be viewed by school staff immediately.

While our preference is for payments to be made via the portal, we will still accept payment via cash, cheque, money order and EFTPOS.


NAPLAN 2023

Students in Years 7 and 9 recently completed the NAPLAN Online tests at Kincumber High School. NAPLAN has been delivered using laptops in an online format for a number of years at our school, but this year was the first time our recent technology upgrades have enabled us to administer the tests in our Hall with the entire year group together. This is a huge achievement for our school which has involved significant investment in laptops, internet capability, high-density WiFi access points and our school network. These changes also facilitated successful testing without student tests being compromised due to technical difficulties. Being able to administer online testing in the Hall has been a game changer in restoring the calm and focused testing environment which benefitted groups of the past when testing was completed on paper. Students in both Year 7 and Year 9 were fantastic across the four testing days acting incredibly maturely, taking their tests seriously and following the complicated setup instructions vital for stable and uninterrupted online testing. Students requiring special provisions such as enlarged text, extra time, tinted screen overlays, small group withdrawal, etc. were able to undertake their tests in the Library where these important adjustments could be administered. Over the four principal days of testing KHS successfully delivered more than 1000 tests in writing, reading, conventions of language and numeracy. This fantastic achievement would not be possible without the tireless efforts of our teachers who have been preparing their students for NAPLAN success and the expert team that organised the testing sessions. A huge thank you is in order for our Learning and Support Teachers - Tracey Malievac and Sally Biddle, Technology Support Officer - Robert Toy and Head Teacher Administration - Kelvin White. We are all looking forward to examining this years NAPLAN data when it becomes available to better support the ongoing development in literacy and numeracy of all students at KHS.





TAS FACULTY REPORT

Year 12 Information Processes and Technology

Throughout this term the Year 12 IPT students have been working on Multimedia projects using Unity – a cross platform game engine widely used in commercial video game development.











Students have developed video games such as 2D and 3D platformers, FPS space exploration, driving/racing game and a 3D chess game. The quality of projects that the students have produced has

exceeded expectations.
















The students are currently working on menu systems for their games to complete their projects to a professional level.

Year 9 Engineering

Throughout this term the Year 9 Engineering students have been participating in an engineering challenge to see who could design and build a column that could withstand the most compression force when placed in a vice.







The students were given 10 paddle pop sticks and 2 milk bottle caps and used hot guns to construct the column.



Year 10 Engineering

During this term the Year 10 Engineering students have been participating in an engineering challenge to design and build a propeller driven car. The students were supplied with a battery pack and a motor with the rest of the materials being sourced from recycled or waste. Investigations around blade design, limiting weight and aeronautical consideration are all part of the challenge considerations. Students need to design a vehicle that goes the fastest over a number of distances.

It's been a productive few weeks in the HSIE department with lots of learning based activities implemented to enhance students engagement and learning in their respective subjects.

Year 12 Business Studies students had the opportunity to learn about the marketing strategies employed by Taronga Zoo as part of their HSC content. From examining the 4 Ps to their branding and social media presence, students learnt a great deal from the zoo excursion and Taronga's marketing strategies with Ms Crick and Ms Spacavento.

Mr Barron's Year 12 Aboriginal Studies students gained insight and knowledge from guest speaker Gavi Duncan, a senior education and tourism officer at at Darkinjung land council, who came to the school helping students with their major works and educating them on how to connect with people in the community.

Our Year 11 Legal Studies class have been busy learning about sources of contemporary Australian law and just completed their first assessment task. Students have been diligent in their learning preparations for the task and are to be congratulated on their commitment to learning.

Year 8 students are embracing the history of the Medieval period, learning about the Feudal system of the Middle Ages and in particular the social class differences for peasants, knights and nobles. Fascination with the black plague, weaponry and torture devices also piqued many students' attention!

Year 9 have just completed their in-class assessment on the topic of Making a Nation. Students have studied the federation of Australia as well as the formation of the statements from British colonisation and the impacts of colonisation on the Aboriginal population. Students will now begin to delve into the lead up and impact of World War 1. Some students will be making commemorative poppies in the lead up to our school Anzac Day service.


Finally a thank you to our amazing HSIE staff, who work diligently with our HSIE students to create wonderful and engaging learning opportunities.



YEAR 7 GEOGRAPHY FIELDWORK EXCURSIONS

BOUDDI NATIONAL PARK - LANDSCAPES & LANDFORMS

Year 7 undertook their Stage 4 mandatory fieldwork excursions in Week 7 this term visiting Bouddi National Park. Students began at the historic Maitland Bay General Store which is now an information centre for the national park before walking along the Maitland Bay Track to Maitland Bay and then onto Putty Beach. Along the way students gathered vital primary data to help complete their first assessment task. Students gathered weather data at various locations, completed fieldwork sketches, completed soil rubs and learned about the history of the area and how it was traditionally used and managed by local Aboriginal people. Students have been learning about how gradational forces sculpt the landscape to create various landforms. As part of the excursion students could see an example of a very rare geological formation known as tessellated pavement (see image at the bottom of this page). Under immense pressure the rock can crack into a grid that almost looks man-made. Across the two days students were excellent, cooperatively completing their booklets and acting maturely throughout the day. Well done Year 7!

Students were only given 30 minutes to design and create their idea. Some very interesting and creative designs were developed. AMNESTY INTERNATIONAL CLUB

With Ms. Hayden's guidance interested students from Years 7 to 12 have begun to explore the workings of Amnesty International and the various human rights injustices that are occurring throughout the world. Their focus goal for this term was to work alongside the leadership team's promotion of International Women's Day on the 8 March. Students implemented their first awareness campaign, discussing at assembly the issues currently facing women under the Taliban regime in Afghanistan. Student-led brainstorming on this humanitarian issue led to the creation of leaflets and posters with a QR code - asking those interested to sign a petition to our Australian government representatives to increase their opposition on the Taliban's actions; and provide further education and humanitarian assistance for women and girls. Students also distributed purple ribbons as a symbol of the importance of International Women's day, and how far we still need to go to ensure equality for all women around the world. Well done to all students and we look forward to seeing their next global awareness campaign in Term 2.


From The Faculty


Equipment for Learning

MATHEMATICS

At this time, if we have enough interest, we will also look at starting a Maths In Trade Pathway class. This class will still be covering the same mathematics as other classes, but it will be aimed more at the mathematics required to be a successful apprentice. Anyone in Year 9 considering gaining an apprenticeship is welcome to talk to Mrs Woodley or Mr White about this opportunity. The sheet to register your interest is on the wall outside the maths staffroom. It will only run if we have at least 20 students interested.

A reminder that every student should have a calculator with them every day, and a book which is used solely for maths. An 'everything' book cannot be collected by the teacher, and is not satisfactory.

Year 9 enrichment maths have now moved onto a topic on Topology. Their last task for fractals was creating 3-D fractals, some of which you can see in the images.

Mrs Cardy's Year 10 students were using postits to gain a better understanding of area last week. The window and desks in the room looked very colourful!




Remember that we are available on Wednesdays from 2:30-3:15 for after school maths. Any level student is welcome to come along and get some extra help.












Generation Tomorrow
