PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



We've had a fantastic start to the term, filled with energy, participation and achievement across all year groups. Our school community continues to thrive as students immerse themselves in a wide range of opportunities. In the coming weeks, we are proud to have students representing Kincumber High School in three major creative and performing arts events: Starstruck, Youth in Performing Arts (YIPA), and the Central Coast Dance Festival. These events not only showcase the incredible talent of our students but also reflect the dedication of our staff in supporting their creative growth. Kincumber High has a long-standing tradition of excellence in the creative and performing arts, and we can't wait to celebrate our students' success as they take to the stage.

We are also very pleased to share that the preliminary 2025 NAPLAN results have now been released for four of the five key domains: Reading, Numeracy, Spelling, and Grammar and Punctuation. The fifth domain — Writing — requires more time to mark and will be released later this year. Once all assessments are finalised, individual student results will be provided to parents and carers. These results offer valuable insights into how students are progressing in foundational learning areas.

I'm incredibly proud to report that both Year 7 and Year 9 students have achieved outstanding results. A total of 62 Year 7 students achieved in the highest performance band in at least one domain, and 44 Year 9 students also reached the top band in this national assessment. Every student who achieved a result in the highest band has been personally congratulated with a phone call home from me, received an academic certificate, and a chocolate to acknowledge their exceptional effort. We are proud of each student's dedication and the positive learning culture we are building together at Kincumber High School.



In Weeks 2 and 3, all students were invited to participate in a newly introduced student survey—part of a revised Department of Education initiative that replaces the Tell Them from Me survey previously used. This updated survey is designed to amplify student voice and provide a comprehensive snapshot of student engagement, expectations, and sense of belonging at school. These measures are critical to understanding how students experience their learning environment and ensuring every student feels connected, supported, and valued.

At Kincumber High, we place great importance on student feedback, and the insights gained from this survey are instrumental in shaping our future priorities. In addition to wellbeing and engagement, students were asked to share their thoughts on school facilities and the range of learning and extracurricular opportunities available to them. Previous student surveys have informed infrastructure improvements, supported the development of wellbeing programs, and helped us respond directly to the evolving needs of our students. We look forward to using this year's results to continue building a school environment that supports every student to thrive.

The commencement of Term 2 has brought some staffing changes, and it is my pleasure to share both a celebration and a farewell. Long-serving Creative and Performing Arts teacher, Tatiana Daykin (Berberian), has been officially appointed as a permanent member of staff at Kincumber High School. Tatianna is an incredibly hardworking, passionate, and dedicated teacher who is deeply respected by her colleagues and much loved by students and parents alike. Her appointment ensures valuable continuity for students and programs in Visual Arts, a faculty with a long-standing reputation for excellence at our school.

At the same time, we farewell and sincerely thank Sandra McNaught, who has formally retired after many years of outstanding service. Sandra's dedication to her students, her craft, and the Visual Arts team has left a lasting impact on our school community. We are pleased to share that, despite her retirement, Sandra will continue to work a couple of days each week to support student learning and provide stability during this important time of year. Her presence will ensure a smooth transition and continued success in Visual Arts. We thank Sandra for her incredible contribution and look forward to her continued involvement at Kincumber High School.






DEPUTY PRINCIPAL - YEARS 8, 10, 12






Finally, a reminder that our Athletics Carnival is set for Friday, June 6. We look forward to seeing our students compete, show house spirit, and enjoy a great day together.

ENGLISH REPORT

As we move through the term, I am pleased to share updates on the hard work and dedication of our Year 12 English students as they prepare for their upcoming assessments and Major Work projects.

Our Year 12 Advanced, Standard, and Studies students are currently focused on their Module B assessment essay, which is due on May 30. This marks their third assessment for the year, with only one more to go before the Trial examinations. We are proud of their commitment to their studies, and I would like to extend a special congratulations to them for attending workshops during the recent holidays. These sessions provided an excellent opportunity for students to revise and enhance their essays for both Module A and the Common Module. During these workshops, we emphasised the importance of technique-driven analysis within their essays, ensuring that their thesis statements and topic sentences are supported by detailed textual analysis. This rigorous approach is crucial for achieving Band 5 and 6 results.

I would also like to take this opportunity to express our heartfelt gratitude to our wonderful English teachers. Their dedication and willingness to give up their time to support our students during the holidays is greatly appreciated

Furthermore, our Extension 1 English students are preparing for their Essay and Panel Interview Assessment, scheduled for June 3. Meanwhile, the Extension 2 students are diligently working towards the completion of their Major Work, which is due at the end of this term. We are excited to see the creativity and innovation that these projects will showcase of the amazing writers Ruby B, Ella D, Maya B, and Sophia M.

In addition to Year 12 updates, I want to highlight the efforts of our Year 11 students as they work towards their Multimodal Assessments, which will take place in Week 9 and contribute significantly to their overall mark—worth 40%. To enrich their understanding of the deep issues raised in the Module, we will be watching classic films such as *Life is Beautiful* and *A Beautiful Mind*. These films will serve as powerful tools to engage students and provoke thoughtful discussions about the module.

Our Year 9 students have recently begun an engaging unit on Speculative Fiction, guided by the thought-provoking question: "What If?" This unit encourages students to explore imaginative possibilities and critically examine our world—both now and in the future. To enrich their understanding, students are viewing films such as Jurassic Park, The Lorax, and Wall-E which ask questions to ask questions such as, what if dinosaurs still walked the earth? or what if there were no more trees? These films challenge them to reflect on significant themes related to environmental issues, technology, and the impact of human actions. In addition, students are reading a selection of short stories designed to provoke thoughtful discussion about the future we are shaping. We are excited to see how this unit inspires creative and critical thinking among our students.


Year 10 Exams were on Friday Week 2. They have been working diligently on their drafts for both their Creative and Essay responses on the unit on Dystopia.






SCIENCE REPORT

The end of Term 1 and the beginning of Term 2 have seen the culmination of an exciting range of projects. Our Marine Studies students undertook their water safety tests at The Grant McBride Baths at The Entrance, allowing them to snorkel at Toowoon Bay. They also completed a range of gyotaku Japanese fish prints with fish kindly donated by SeaCoast Fishing. Meanwhile our Year 9 cohort were not "nervous" about demonstrating how their bodies detect and respond to changes in the environment through a range of balance and coordination challenges. The "smarties" in Year 7 engaged in a range of graphing and data collection activities as part of numeracy week, while our "bright sparks" in Year 8 completed their lighthouse projects. We are looking forward to more hands on experiences in Science this term!

SCIENCE REPORT

During Term 2 we also have Year 8 and Year 10 choosing their subjects for Year 9 and Year 11 respectively. This is an exciting time, with lots of decisions to be made. Science offers Biology, Chemistry, Earth and Environmental Science, Investigating Science, and Physics. Students may choose up to 6 units (3 subjects) of Science in Year 11. We strongly recommend you have a discussion with your classroom teacher if you are considering choosing any of these courses. There are two other subjects managed by the Science faculty which deserve a special mention: Agriculture and Marine Studies.

Agriculture is considered a TAS subject by NESA, however, it is managed by the Science Faculty at Kincumber High School.

As such, students may choose up to 3 Science Courses (Biology, Chemistry, Earth and Environmental Science, Investigating Science or Physics) in addition to undertaking Agriculture.

Marine Studies is a Board Endorsed Course. This means it will not contribute to a student's ATAR. However, undertaking Marine Studies does NOT prevent a student from obtaining an ATAR.

If a student undertakes Marine Studies and 5 other Board Developed Courses – and keeps all their subjects in Year 12 – they will be able to obtain an ATAR.

Additionally, Marine Studies is considered a TAS subject by NESA, however, it is managed by the Science Faculty at Kincumber High School.

As such, students may choose up to 3 Science Courses (Biology, Chemistry, Earth and Environmental Science, Investigating Science or Physics) in addition to undertaking Marine Studies.

Welcome back to school for another term. The HSIE staff are geared up and ready for another busy term with many key learning events, activities, excursions and activities lined up for HSIE classrooms in the coming months. As always it is a busy term in terms of assessment, and this term we will also be completing the Half Yearly reports for all year groups.

Year 7 Geography students are still completing their work on the Place and Liveability Topic.

Year 8 History are presently finishing up their studies on the Spanish Conquest of the Americas and will soon commence work on the Polynesian Expansion across the Pacific.

Year 9 History students are completing their work on WWI and WWII this term.

Year 10 just completed their first series of formal examinations in the Hall, among which was a 1 hour Geography Examination. Students are to be congratulated on their preparation and maturity towards this important assessment task. In the classroom they continue finalising their work on Coastal Management by conducting an international case study to compare coastal processes and management locally to another location from around the world.

Year 10 students are also encouraged to start thinking seriously about their subject choices for Year 11 and 12 by having important discussions with their teachers about their interests, ideas for the future and of course their skills and strengths that they can draw upon in the senior years. It is sometimes difficult to navigate the many choices on offer so it is vital to talk to as many people as possible about what is available in order to make the best choices.



YEAR 11 ANCIENT HISTORY - MUMMIFICATION ACTIVITIES

Year 11 Ancient History students recently put their knowledge of ancient practices to the test by conducting a hands-on mummification experiment—using apples! This engaging activity helped students understand the science behind how soft tissue is preserved, whether through intentional processes like those used in ancient Egypt or unintentional means such as extreme cold, dryness, or bog environments. Students applied a mixture of baking soda and salt to draw out moisture from apple slices, simulating the desiccation process used in real mummification. Over the holidays, we left the apples to mummify and, upon returning to school, observed how removing moisture helps prevent decay—deepening our understanding of both ancient mummification rituals and the science behind natural preservation.




SMART....STUDY..... SKILLS

Steps towards understanding - Adopt and adapt new skills to enhance your study routine.

Tips for creating and using your own study poster:

- Set aside 45 minutes only to create this resource. Just work quickly to 'get it done'.
- Use readily available materials large pieces of paper or card, coloured markers, and diagrams.
- Divide your poster into areas of syllabus content. Create dot points using key information from a topic. Be concise with key, subject specific, metalanguage and important facts.
- Use coloured diagrams, visuals and memory mnemonics, to assist in steps towards understanding.
- Once completed, blue tack it to a wall space at home that you visit often eg near the kettle or fridge.
- Finally, take 5 minutes, every few days to read it to yourself or better, read it to someone. You will be surprised at how quickly you learn and remember the facts on your poster!!!





MATHEMATICS REPORT

In Week 9 of last term Kincumber High School had a Numeracy focus across all learning areas, incorporating numeracy into all Year 7 lessons to emphasise that numeracy is not just used in maths, but across all areas of the school.

Year 7 Science students developed their numeracy skills with Smartie Science. Students measured, weighed, and calculated volumes throughout the lesson. They gathered data across all groups to determine the most popular colour and created column graphs of their findings.

In Visual Art, Year 7 students have been exploring the concepts of symmetry and asymmetry through their Name Totem Assessment Task. Using creative design and artistic techniques, they have crafted unique totems that reflect their individuality while applying their understanding of balance and visual composition.

Year 7 in HSIE focused on latitude and longitude-exploring diagrams of the globe to understand why we measure location using degrees. Students then broke maps into quadrants and had a go at locating various volcanoes around the world using latitude and longitude. To confirm their understanding, classes spent another lesson completing assigned Kahoots, where they practised plotting different countries before putting their knowledge to the test with some fun live games together as a class.

We've also created additional Kahoot quizzes that teachers can assign on Google Classroom for homework, helping students continue to build this important numeracy skill.

This is a great example of a geographical skill that will support students throughout Stages 4, 5, and 6 in Geography — highlighting just how important numeracy is across all faculties at Kincumber High School.

English worked with Year 8, calculating and graphically representing the distances between locations in Percy Jackson's quest to find the 'Lightning Thief.'





GENERATION TOMORROW REPORT


In Generation Tomorrow, all Year 7 and 8 students participate in a fortnightly program designed to strengthen the four key Cs of 21st-century learning: Communication, Creative Thinking, Critical Thinking, and Collaboration.

Last term, our focus was Communication. Students began by writing letters to their future selves, reflecting on their current goals and aspirations. Throughout the term, they explored how communication changes depending on context and audience, and how to adapt their style accordingly. Lessons included conflict resolution strategies, email conventions, and how to communicate effectively online using platforms like Google Classroom.

This term, students are diving into Creative Thinking. They have kicked off the unit by designing vision boards that imagine what their lives might look like in ten years. Using Adobe tools, students are bringing these visions to life through digital media. The term will continue to challenge their creative muscles through the use of platforms such as Canva and TinkerCad, and through imaginative problem-solving tasks like designing the schools of the future.
